There were also consumed 500 bushels of cats, 25 bushels seed barley, 30 bushels wheat, 13 bags Mummy peas, 2 bags small peas, 500 bushels turnips and a turnip pulper, 1 lead chop just brought from the mill, a cutter and a pair of bobsleighs, a wagon box and a fanning mill, Mr. Wright says it was horrible to hear the poor animals bellowing and roaring in their anguish and suffering, he being unable to help or release them, the whole barn being one mass of flames when discovered; he also wishes us to state that although someone hes done him a great wrong, he wants to return his thanks to his neighbors and friends for the many kind nesses extended to him in his hour of trouble, help, in the shape of provisions, fodder, and labor on the farm, having poured in from all help, in the shape of provisions, fodder, and labor on the farm, having poured in from all directions. 
