SERMON TO CHILDREN.—The children turned
up on Sabbath last to hear the sermon
that the Rev. J. F. Mearns had formerly an-
nounced that he would preach to them on
that occasion. The pastor advised the
members of the church and it was pleasing to
hear them so heartily join in the singing,
and so promptly the questions that were
asked them by the pastor, and see them
take such a deep interest in the sermon.
The pastor gave some kind illustrations
of the necessity of "neglect of duty";
with all its long train of attendant conse-
quences, proceeded to exhort his young hearers
to watch against evil—to keep their hearts
to such diligence, for out of the heart are
the issues of life; and consequently if the heart
is impure the life must be impure also. The
great truth was then pointed out that the
neglect of duty is due chiefly to the fact that
they are "too busy" to attend to it, or that
their extra anxiety for their fellow men. The
children's sermon was indeed a practical
one in that it both young and old present
could learn important truths, and just such
the presence of hearing. Let ministers preach
more sermon to children and then older people
will get the practical lessons they require, and
receive much more spiritual good, than from
the preaching of sermons said to be eloquent
and full of profundity of thought.
