Velocity of Meteors.

For the Children.

I have just been reading an incident in the life of Cardinal Manning, which brought to my mind the subject which you so ably advocate in the Citizen, namely the work among children. Although preaching temperance, the Cardinal was not a total abstainer until some time after he had identified himself with the temperance movement. It was at a meeting of some school children whom he was going to enroll unnder the temperance banner, and after speaking to them of the evils of the drink habit, and the force of good example, he said, "Now let us kneel down and take the pledge."

The children knelt down, the Cardinal among them, and they repeated the pledge after him, and when they got up, a little girl who was nearest the Cardinal, in that impressive manner peculiar to children, said: "Now we are temperance like you." His Eminence often used to speak of this, how he had come to take the pledge unconditionally; and he said, having taking it, surrounded by children whose souls were unstained by sin, it made his pledge doubly binding, and he would keep it until the day of his death. We hear a great deal said about the influence of the children (now being trained) when they become men and women, but not so much upon their influence on the present generation. If I may be pardoned for referring to

my own work in the past, I would say nothing in the world inspired me like the bright, sparkling eyes of the children, the grand possibilities that lay before them if saved from the snares and pitfalls of the liquor traffic, both in the homes and the licensed saloons of our country.




