

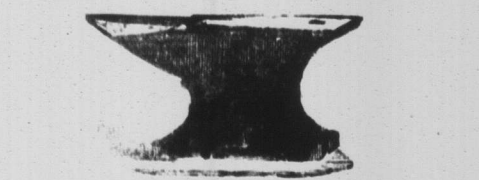

ON MONDAY NIGHT last as a lady and her daughter were passing the corner of Glasgow and William streets when they were assailed by two love-lit ruffians, who, without warning, rushed upon them, knocking one lady down and following them up for some distance. A few nights later a gentleman and his wife on passing near the same place were stopped by some concealed wretches. Every possible effort should be made by the town authorities to bring, if possible, the mean cowardly perpetrators to swift account.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—The special through freight, sixteen cars of timber and grain leaving Lindsay on Monday night last had in charge conductor Fair, driver Robt. Johnston, fireman Fred Murray, and brakemen Purdy and Shields—all Lindsay men. When about three miles east of Campbellford on the Grand Junction Railway the following morning at five o'clock the engine was thrown off the track by some obstructions placed on the rails. At four o'clock the same morning a little distance from the accident, a farmer on passing removed a tie from the rails which had evidently been placed there by the engine. On leaving the rails the train ran a few car lengths on the sleepers when the engine rolled into the deep ditch followed by a car of timber etc.; then car after car of oats and corn followed in tremendous succession until the engine was deeply buried beneath a promiscuous mass of broken cars and spilled grain. The driver Robert Johnston stood at his post till the engine rolled over, and then attempting to jump was partially buried beneath the rails, had both legs and arms badly scalded, one knee cut and the neck sprained. He was removed from the wreck more dead than alive, but being a strong man of great vitality will doubtless recover. The fireman, Fred Murray, jumped also as the engine was rolling into the ditch, and escaped with a few bruises and slight scalds. Conductor Fair and brakeman Shields were in the van and were not injured. Brakeman Purdy who it is supposed was on the top of the tender was buried in the wreck. Mr. Geo. H. Newton, Editor of the "Warder," was on the train. "The wonder is that all were not killed. At 9 o'clock the auxiliary train arrived from Belleville, one coming from Campbellford a few moments later. They immediately commenced to clear the debris and replace the ties. After three hours work they found poor Purdy in the middle of the wreck dead. The poor fellow must have been scalded and smothered to death as marks plainly indicated such. When found he was sitting like a wreck. His mother resides at Fort Hope. He has lately made Lindsay his home." The railway men speak of having recently encountered obstructions in several places on the line, but with this exception have not produced any serious results. A vigilance should be kept along the line so as to, if possible, have the evil disposed parties brought swiftly to justice.
