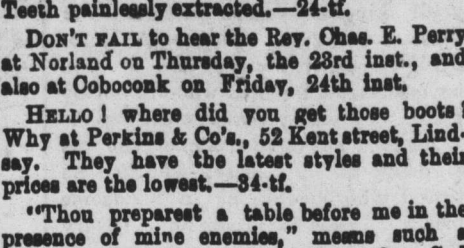

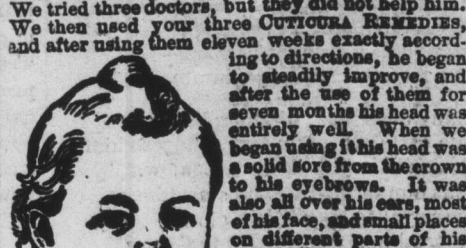

It was a good poem, and Miss Flaville read it with taste and feeling, showing in several passages marked power. Her fan was in using so low a tone at the beginning, that the opening lines were inaudible to those at the back. Mr. Jack Fitzgerald distinguished himself in "Clear and Cool," his voice ringing clear and true, and the boys in the back seats showed most enthusiastic appreciation. Miss Ferris in her Scotch recitation was merited applause and added force to her instruction in elocution. 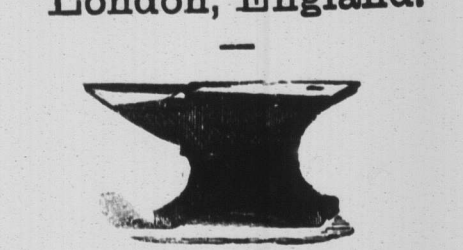
