social to The Warder. CANADA THE GREATER BRITAIN. - This was the subject upon which the Rev. Chas. E. Perry, of Toronto, delivered an address here on Thursday evening, the 23rd instant. It was under the auspices of L.O.L. No. 1112, and Mr. Wm. Batty, W.M., occupied the chair and in a few well chosen words introduced the creater who are vising to great was duced the speaker, who on rising to speak was greeted with the most enthusiastic applause. In his address he referred to Canada's extent being forty times as large as Great Britain and exceeding in size the United States by 127,000 square miles, and with as much fertile territory. The district of Alberta alone conterritory. The district of Alberta aione contains 100,000 square miles of beautiful land. There is plenty of room in Canada tor our young men without going over to the United States. Dr. Briggs said that Canada was described in the containing from sea to cribed in scripture as a Dominion from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth. Canada has majestic mountains, prairies "boundless and beautiful," grand prairies "boundless and beautiff, grand lakes and magnificent rivers, vast forests and unexhaustible mines. Its fisheries are among the richest in the world. Our mines are in their infancy of development. Canada is an agricultural country also, and has about \$1,000,000,000 invested in agriculture and agricultural machinery. At the time of Confederation we had only 2,400 miles of railway; federation we had only 2,400 miles of railway; now we have nearly 14 000. The Canadian Pacific, trans-continental line, completed from ocean to ocean, binding the scattered parts of this wast confederation together, is the longest railway in the world. Great things are confidently looked for in the way of Asiatic and Australian trade by the opening of the Canadian Pacific railway, and when the projected line of steamers on the Pacific connecting therewith is an accomplished fact, this route will doubtless become the greatest highway of the East. At Confederation we had but 8,500 miles of electric telegraph; to-day we have 50,000 miles. We have also 15,000 miles of telephone wires, and 650 publications, newspapers and magazines, and over seventy are papers and magazines, and over seventy are daily newspapers. Our school system is second to none in the world, which is seen in maritime power, is only exceeded by the United States and Great Britain. Canadians have much to be proud of in this great inheritance, which for resources and possibilities exceeds eyen Great Britain.

In introducing the speaker of the evening the chairman referred to the salient points of the address given by Mr. Perry at Norland the previous evening and had no hesitation in predicting for the audience a treat on the present occasion. The speaker on coming ferward was most enthusiastically applauded. Some men who are opposed to the Orange Association say that the order is waning. 
