

To Keep Refrigerators Sweet.

This is one of the most important duties ef the housekeeper. No matter how many servants she may keep she should once a week. The refrigerator should be

A glossy, black kitten makes a splendid

A glossy, black kitten makes a splendid in perfect condition. If the lining be broken in any part, so that the water soaks into the wood, attend to the relining at once; or, if the refrigerator be not worth that, discard it wholly. When possible, avoid taving the drain pipe connected with the plumbing in the house. Have the refrigerator placed where it can be flooded with air and light whenever necessary, but, of conversion of the control of th necessary, but, of course, in as cool a

suds; then pour boiling water over them. Place them in the sun; or, if that fails, Place them in the sun; or, if that fails, by the range, that they may be perfectly dried. Now take out the ice rack and wash and scald in the same way, except that, as there are grooves or wires in this, the greatest care must be used to get out every particle of dirt that may have lodged there. Next wash out the ice compartment, running the flexible wire rod down the pipe, that nothing shall lodge there. Put two teaspoonfuls of washing-soda into a quart of botling water and put on the fire. When this boils, pour it into the ice compartment; follow this with a kettle full of boiling water, and wipe dry. Now wash the other parts

this with a kettle full of boiling water, and wipe dry. Now wash the other parts of the refrigerator with hot soap-suds and wipe perfectly dry. Be careful to get the doors and ledges clean and dry. Leave the refrigerator open for an hour and then return the ice and food to it.

I plan this work for a day when the ice man is due. The work is done immediately after breaktast, so that the retrigerator is ready when the ice comes. Should you, after this care, have trouble, do not use the refrigerator. It will be far better to get along without the comfort it affords than to endanger health and life by using a contaminated article. Food should never be put in a refrigerator while warm, because it absorbs the tor while warm, because it absorbs the flavors of other food and also heats the refrigerator.—Ladies' Home Journal.



Parliamentary Bars. It must have been edifying to the law-abiding people of Canada to learn the other day that the keeper of the restau-rant in the House of Commons had been fined by the police magistrate at Ottawa tor violation of the liquor law. It is a scandal and a shame that directly underneath the chamber where meets the highest legislative body in Cauada, the free and unrestrained sale of intoxicants is illegally carried on during the session with the knowledge and consent of a majority of that House. In this case the lawmaters are notoriously the most lawmakers are notoriously the most flagrant law breakers. At almost any hour of the day or night, not even excepting the Christian Sabbath, does liquor flow freely in the House of Commons bar, and to a less extent, in the Senate bar. Is it any wonder that a session at Ottawa is known to mean to some a prolonged debauch, and that bright futures are blasted by a short time spent at the capital? Is it any wonder, in short, that politics has become too dirty a business for some of the best men

in Canada. This thing has gone far enough.

There are plenty of saloons in Ottawa without the presence of two illegal bars under the very nose of Parliament, From time to time efforts have been made to restrict the evil, but it con't be done. The thing must be prohibited. Ontario's legislature can get along without a bar, and it is not a conspicuous failure.

Quebec has abolished the sale of liquor
within the legislative precincts. In no
other part of the Dominion would such a practice be tolerated. This is not a party question, for there are those on both sides of the House who would keep the bar where it is. This is a question of principle, and it cannot be laughed down. Those who know assert that the thing is a positive evil at Ottawa. Let us hope that the conviction lately obtained will have a beneficial effect. Henceforth let there be no more parliamentary bars.




