They have not availed to bring the Dominion Government to its senses, and the outrageous discrimination against American shippers in the matter of tolls on the Welland Canal is persistently and defiantly maintained.
But President Harrison has by no means exhausted the means of reprisal at his command. Let him deal a death blow to the

Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk railways extinguishing their power of competing with American railroads on unfair terms, and he will not only bring the Tory Ministers at Ottows to their knees, but give a tremendous impetus to the movement for the political fusion of Canada and the United States.
