BY-LAW NO. 362. A By-Law to establish a Line of Road across Lots A and D in Concession A in Somerville.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Somerville enacts as follows: That a line of road be established across lots A and D in Concession A in the Township of Somerville, known and described as follows, that is to say: Commencing at a point on the Monk Road at a distance of four chains north, ten and one-half degrees west, from the centre of the north end of the bridge which spans the Gull River in said lot A. Thence south fifty-two and three-fourths degrees west, five chains and one inch, thence south forty-one degrees west, three chains, thence south thirty-five degrees west, thirteen chains and thirty-five links, thence south thirty-one degrees west, nine chains and one inch, and the above described line to be the centre thereof.
