The Orillia Packet gives the following summary of the amendments made in the game law at the last session of the Ontario Legislature. The close season for deer, elk, reindeer, moose, cariboo is fixed at the 15th of November to the 1st of November of the following year. The killing of these animals, except deer, is prohibited until November, 1895.

Dogs accustomed to pursue deer must not run at large during the hunting season, and such dogs found running may be killed on sight.
The killing of deer by any one person is restricted to two each season. Hunting or killing deer by "crusting" or while "yarding" is declared unlawful. No fawn shall oe hunted, killed, taken or possessed Common carriers and others are prohibited from transporting any wild deer or the skin thereof, on any occasion, except between 1st and 22nd o November in each year, unless accompanied by an affidavit that the same was hunted and other water fowl, or any other game birds or animals, (including black and gray squirrels and hares), not provided for, is fixed at 15th December to 15th September the following year. Quail and wild turkeys, 15th December to 15th October following, Swan or geese, 1st May to 15th September following. Ducks of all kinds; 15th December to the 1s Sept. following. Wild turkeys are preserved until 15th October, 1897, and beavers, otters, or fisher, until 1st November, 1897. The killing of ducks is limited to 300 by any person in prohibition can be put up for every forty acres of land. Non-residents of Ontario and Quebec must take out a license at \$25 for a season, which must be produced on request. Guests of a resident tree for one week. A board of three fish and game commissioners, and a secretary, is to be appointed, who can make regulations and appoint a chief warden and other game and fish wardens. Procedure is provided for the enforcement of the Act.

The Advance of the Oholera.

A special article in The World yesterday gave an interesting account of the progress of past cholera epidemics. The history of the present epidemic since June 27, 1892, when 48 new cases and 88 deaths were officially reported in one day at Baku, the Bussian port on the Caspian, is sufficiently well known to readers of the press despatches. Studied in the light of history and recent

developments it will be seen that the disease travels in well-established circuits and with increased rapidity as the facilities for communication increase. Thus, while in the early part of this century it took fourteen years to travel from the Caspian to England, it has accomplished the same distance this year in three months.

The cholera is certainly coming. It is travelling again over the same route it has followed for a century. It is already prevalent in two ports in close communication with America, and just as surely as it has invaded England will it come to our shores.

It need not get this far. If from culpable oversight, carelessness or penuriousness it does get through the quarantine lines it need not spread. Isolation, sanitation, disinfection and humane care are the safeguards. Money will secure these. The Canal Retaliation Does Not

Amount to Much. OTTAWA, August 24.—The more the canal tolls question is looked into the less formidable does it appear so far as the amount involved by President Harrison's proclamation imposing twenty cents per ton is concerned. Last night it was mentioned that General Poe gave the amount of Canadian shipping passing through the Sault St. Mary canal last season at 350,000 tons but this of course included both east and west bound vessels for American as well as Canadian ports. During the past few days a very careful analysis has been made in the Department of Railways and Canals of all the east bound freight from Canadian and United States ports on Lake Superior which passed through the Soc canal, and the Welland canal to Canadian ports during the seasen of 1891 with the following result: volved by President Harrison's proclamation

It thus appears that the total quantity of freight which passed through the Welland, as well as the "Soo" canal, last year from both Canadian and United States ports for Canadian Few publications have eyer attracted more ports was only 97,126 tons, the tolls en which at twenty cents per ton would amount to \$19,425. This covers the whole period of navigation; but it must be remembered that the period of heaviest shipments, especially from Canadian to Canadian ports is over, and that for the two months or so which remains of the shipping season, the quantity to pass through the Welland canal is not likely to be as great as in the early part of the season. For the months of September, October and November last year the total quantity which passed through the Soo and Welland canals from both Canadian and United States ports for Canadian ports was 43,116 tons which at twenty cents per ton would make the trifling amount of \$8,623. Even should this year's shipments be larger on account of the growing popularity of the St. Lawrence route, the amount involved is not likely to exceed \$10,000, which really seems a very insignificant sum for two great nations like Canada and the United States to have a dispute over and would be almost ridiculous were it not for the principle involved that Canada has the right to regulate
