

Even in New York it was the intensity of the cholera scare which moved the authorities there to action, and in one day 20 dealers were arrested for selling impure milk. No summer is allowed to pass that the Dominion Government authorities do not invade the municipalities in order to see that good milk is supplied. At the present time they have been more than ordinary particular.

Those who have made up their minds to take this cholera scare seriously into their imagination, as Sir Oliver Mowat might say, had best begin at once. Here are the regulation items of advice and warning to the timid. Drink no water that has not been boiled, enter no theatre, church of place of public meeting whatever, wherever two or three persons are gathered together avoid them, boil your milk and mix a little lime with it, use chloride of lime and carabolic acid liberally allover your residental premises, eat no fruit, and do your own washing. By observing these precautions it is quite probable that you will escape the pestilence as long as it keeps out of the country. Seeing that the quarantine officials at Grosse Isle are attending to their business thoroughly it is more than likely that those who are not burdened with morbid imaginations will pull through just as safely as the others.—To. ronto Empire.


