**South Victoria Agricultural Exhibition.**  
The good people of Victoria donned their holiday attire on Wednesday last and turned out in thousands to greet and honor His Honor, the Hon. Col. Geo. A. Kirkpatrick, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario and Mrs. Kirkpatrick. Their private car was attached to the morning express from Peterboro. Hon. John Dryden Minister of Agriculture for Ontario accompanied the vice-regal party. A splendid guard of honor under command of Captain Hunter and Colonel and Lieut. Ross, with the band, under Leader Albertson, all in the scarlet and blue of the old 46th Battalion, received the Lieut.-Governor and Lady. His worship Mayor Ray, Col. Deacon, Wm. Lowborough, Hon. John Dobson, Charles Fairbairn, M.P., John Kennedy, J. R. McNeillie, Sam Hughes, M.P., the warden Dr. Vrooman, Dr. Cornwall, Thos. Matchett, Robt. Bryans, J. D. Flavell, E. H. Hopkins, John Cruise, ex-M.P.P., Jas. Keith, J. L. Waiters, W. M. Robson, John Connolly, Thos. Waiters and many others were waiting at the station. Capt. Law, R.N., Secretary to Lieut.-Governor Kirkpatrick, accompanied his Honor officially. Mrs. Sam Hughes accompanied Mrs. Kirkpatrick during her stay in Lindsay.

At the station Mayor Ray read the following address:  
To the Honourable Lieutenant Colonel George A. Kirkpatrick, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Ontario.  
MAY I PLEASE YOUR HONOR—We, the Mayor and council of the town of Lindsay on the part of our fellow-citizens, beg to approach your Honor with feelings of the most profound loyalty to our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria and to tender you an expression of cordial welcome on the occasion of your first official visit to the town of Lindsay and the County bearing the name of our Gracious Sovereign whom you in this Province so worthily represent.

We desire to welcome Your Honor and estimate Mrs. Kirkpatrick, on the occasion of your first visit to our town and the Central Exhibition of Arts and Agriculture for this district. We would express the hope that the display of manufacturing and agricultural industries which you will witness during your stay amongst us, may cause you to form a favorable impression of the progress, resources and prosperity of this section of the great Province over which you have been called upon to preside.
