### THE WORLD WAS JUSTIFIED.

The grand jury at the Goderich Assizes yesterday returned no bill in the suit for criminal libel instituted by Mr. M. C. Cameron against Mr. W. F. Maclean of The World. That is to say, they commended The World for its efforts to throw all light possible upon the causes which led to the death of the unfortunate girl Ellen Lomas—efforts which would not have been required had the officers of the law performed their duty and ordered a thorough investigation into all the facts in connection with the "deep damnation of her taking off."

That The World was acting within its province as a newspaper in sending a commissioner to Goderich, and that the account he published was a fair statement of all the circumstances without "fear, favor or affection," was evidenced at the time of publication, and Mr. Cameron's arrest was generally condemned. It is understood that an action for wrongful and malicious arrest will at once be instituted by Mr. Maclean against Mr. Cameron.—The World.

Mr. Maclean came out from the Court House after the return of no bill, accompanied by two or three friends. Just as he left the door some of the group asked him what he was going to do, and he replied: "Sue Cameron for damages for false arrest."  
"You should apologize," said a man who was standing with the crowd.  
"Apologize to whom?" asked Mr. Maclean, turning round.  
"To Mr. Cameron," was the reply, and the man who said it followed alongside Mr. Maclean as he moved down the walk.  
"I will not apologize to Mr. Cameron, to you or anyone."

"Then you are a mean sneak." Whereupon, before anyone knew it, the two were standing up at one another. The scrap lasted a minute or two and blows were exchanged, Maclean's assailant trying to use his feet. Just as Mr. Maclean got his opponent's head in chancery Mr. Holt, a partner of Cameron's rushed in and saved him from the punishment his ruffianly attack deserved. The party was badly damaged. On enquiry it was learned that the assailant of Mr. Maclean was the son-in-law of M. C. Cameron, a Dr. Wilson of London, one of the medical men who performed the Cesarean operation on poor Ellen Lomas, from the effects of which she died, who administered Koch lymph to Laura Gordon for consumption and who accompanied Cameron when he in-

### DR. GILLESPIE OF CANNINGTON FOR SENATOR.

The liberal-conservatives of North Ontario—a staunch, true lot, have placed themselves on record in advocacy of Dr. Gillespie of Cannington for senator. The following resolution was unanimously carried at the recent meeting of the association:—

"Mr. McGillivray, said that he thought the time had arrived when the conservatives of the riding should place on record their appreciation of the able services rendered by Dr. Gillespie to the party during the past twenty-five years. He therefore moved, seconded by Mr. Timothy Doyle:—That we, the delegates, assembled in convention to choose a candidate to contest the North Riding of Ontario for the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, desire to express our appreciation of the great service Donald Gillespie, M.D., President of the Liberal-Conservative Association of North Ontario, has rendered to the conservative party in this riding and elsewhere; he having been President of our Association for the past twenty-five years, and he having contested the riding at a great personal sacrifice, and his willingness at all times to stand by and defend the policy of the Liberal Conservatives in both Federal and Provincial politics, we hereby respectfully suggest to the Premier of the Dominion of Canada and his colleagues in the government to appoint the said Donald Gillespie, M.D., to a Senatorship, as we think this district is entitled to a representative in the senate, as the last Senator in this district was the late Hon. T. N. Gibbes."

### The Terrifying Experience of a Toronto Lady.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Sept. 24.—Mrs. Grimison of 57 Major-street, Toronto, who accompanied the Pan-Prebyterian excursion here to-day, underwent a thrilling experience that she will remember until death, which she miraculously escaped to-day.

The lady, accompanied by her two daughters and the Rev. Mr. Ramsay, were walking across the foot and carriage suspension bridge at the Falls on their return from the American side of the bridge, and the fall she shot party was about two-thirds of the way across the bridge Mrs. Grimison, in stepping up from the carriage way on to the raised foot walk that runs along the side of the bridge, stumbled. From the force of the fall she shot through the opening on the side of the bridge, but luckily striking one of the guys which are placed on the bridge about 30 feet apart. She was thrown back on the iron girder underneath the bridge, which is about a foot wide and 10 feet below the facing of the bridge. On striking this she grasped it with a death grip.

Her sudden disappearance completely paralyzed her two daughters, but Mr. Ramsay quickly climbed over the side railing and slid down the upright to the girder just in time to support Mrs. Grimison from falling to an awful death below, and hung on to the almost lifeless body, keeping Mrs. Grimison and himself on the girder, and called for help, which was soon on hand in the person of Chief Police Young, who had been attracted by the man's cries. He procured a rope and with Harry Williams of the Cliff House and Harry Huntly lowered the rope over to where the two were. Huntly going down adjusted the rope around the lady's body and extricated her clothing from the girders and then they raised her to the driveway of the bridge.

She was taken to the Cliff House, where she was soon restored to consciousness. She lost a hand bag with her purse and watch, but all the articles were found at the water's edge by the police, the watch being smashed into several pieces. Mrs. Grimison's miraculous escape from death should prompt the bridge company to place proper provision on the sides of the bridge, and it is remarkable that some such accident has not taken place before now.

Mrs. Grimison had sufficiently recovered from the nervous prostration to return to her home in the special train evening.

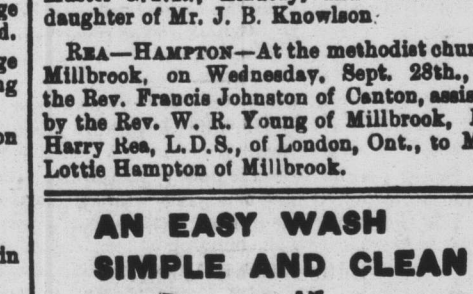
