Entanglement of the liver was the cause of death, which, notwithstanding the best medical advice that could be obtained proved fatal. The funeral on Friday 9th, took place at Fenelon Falls cemetery was largely attended, it being under the management of Spry lodge No. 404, A.F. & A.M., of which lodge Mr. McArthur was a member. We extend to Mr. McArthur and son our sincere sympathy in their bereavement.

THE TOWNSHIP ELECTIONS. - UNLAWFULLY CANVASING. - Candidates are coming rapidly to the front in the municipalities, but in several instances it will be few or no changes. In some places underhand methods are being resorted to. The reform party in a few cases are trying to introduce politics as usual, and are pitting conservatives against conservatives where a reform dare not run; and where they can control, are seeking to run a straight reform ticket. THE WARDER has ever opposed the introduction of politics into municipal affairs. However, the grit rings all over are worth watching.
