Your correspondent is ever ready to give anyone credit for consistency, and the great sachem of the north certainly deserves it for the above caption. The Bob. Ind. pronounces the act simply infallible.

It may be thought presumption to differ from the views of so great an authority, but private persons as well as journalists and legislators have duties to perform and that duty lies in giving to the public the truth, and opposing untruth wherever it may be spoken. The game act of the present is as unnecessary as it is unjust. The act is unnecessary for the reason that the deer are not diminishing, they are as plentiful in this county as they have been any time for the last fifteen years. Ask any practical man, any one who has ranged the woods extensively and they will corroborate this statement, The impression that the deer were scarce in the back country got abroad in this wise: In 1887 forest fires swept over the southern part of the county of Haliburton; the game of all kinds were destroyed or driven out; for the next two years there was but little game in the burned district. Parties came here to hunt as usual but had to go north to find game and no doubt made up their minds that it would be useless to hunt in the settled country


