> During the battle of Brandywine, in the American War, this company by accurate shooting made great havoc in the ranks of the enemy, who threatened, when they could obtain a favorable concentration for could obtain a favorable opportunity for revenge to give the marksmen no quarter. In defiance, however, of this menace, and to make themselves more readily distinguished from their comrades, they dyed the ball in their caps red-with blood, according to tradition-in place of the green worn by the rest of the regiment. The Twenty-eight Foot used to have a singular distinguishing feature in their number badge, which was affixed not only on the front in the usual manner, but also ou the back of their caps. 


