

Men who o of heror Woman Suffrage. but who are out sine to meet the irresignible argument of its justice, have done some talking against it on what they call "practical" grounds. Admitting that on all principles of fair play women should have equal rights with men, they endeavor to make it appear that the doing of right would be followed by some bad consequences, that women would not be "practical politicians" and that ill devised or only lightly considered legislation would be more apt to result from the proposed

extension of the suffrage. Suppose for a moment we drop out of sight the argument of justice, and deal only with this question of expediency. Is it likely that women would be more apt to be led astray by improper motives than are men? We just ask the attention of our prohibition friends to one interesting fact bearing on this question, Kansas is probably the State of the American Union in which probibition is the most complete success. In the greater part of that state the law is rigidly enforced, saloons are absolutely unknown, and in temperance is reduced to a minimum. In Kansas, outside a few large cities (in some of which the law is shamefully violated) the control of police matters is vested in municipal councils. Women twenty one years of age, whether married or single, have an equal right with men to vote in municipal elections. This right they exercise. Municipal officials owe their positions largely to women voters. There is more than a coincidence in the fact that where women have a voice in law enforcement prohibition is a complete success. This "practical" fact ought to be a "practical" settlement of the question of woman's fitness for "practical politics."

Some people are fond of arguing that women would not avail themselves of the right of franchise if they bad it, and therefore it should not be granted. It is hard to see how the "therefore" gets in. If women do not want to vote, why in Syrup.






