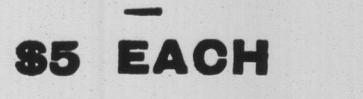

DISASTROUS FIRE.—On Friday night last a serious fire occurred on the farm belonging to Mr. James Bryson in Mariposa, south of Valcartier, by which that gentleman had three horses burned. It appears Mr. James Dickson, who occupied the place, was moving out to make room for a new tenant, Mr. John Marshall. Mr. Dickson had everything moved except two cows and 1500 bushels of turnips, which were lost. Mr. Marshall was more unfortunate as he had his stock all on the premises, and lost 4 fine horses, four fat cattle, three cows, three calves, all his seed grain and feed. The fire occurred from a female servant of Mr. Dixon's falling through a trap door with a lighted lantern in her hand, while doing some work in the hay mow. The lantern went to pieces and instantly set fire to the loose straw lying about. It is very fortunate the poor girl was not rendered insensible by her fall, as if she had been, she must have inevitably been burned to death. Mr. Bryson had an insurance of \$1000 in the London Mutual, on the barn; while Mr. Marshall had \$800 in the Waterloo Mutual on the contents. Much sympathy is expressed for the three gentlemen in their losses.

S. Inspector. The following travelling arrangements have been made:—

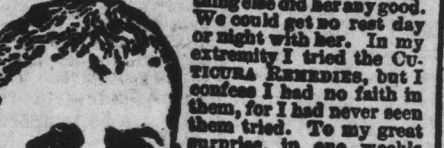
Reduced rates on the railways will be granted to those attending the convention and to coming members of the Association, at one first class fare and one ticket for the round trip, if more than 50 attend; or at one first class fare, if 300 or more attend.

Those travelling to the meeting must purchase first class full rate one way tickets, and obtain a receipt on the Standard certificate for purchase of tickets from agent at starting point, within three days of date of meeting (Sundays not included). The secretary of the association will fill in the said certificate, and the ticket for the return trip will be issued at the above rate. The Standard certificate will be supplied free by the agent where the ticket to Toronto is purchased, and no other form will be recognized by the railway companies.

The regulations of the Education Department provide that "Any teacher who has been elected a delegate, by the Association of his county or inspector's division to the Provincial Teachers' Association shall be at liberty to attend the meeting of such Association for any time not exceeding one week each year, providing he always reports to the trustees such attendance, certified by the secretary of said Provincial Association."

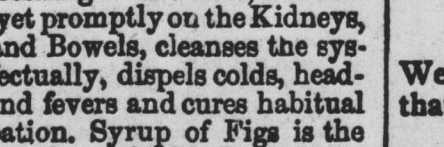
