THE PAST SEVEN YEARS.

Nearly eight years ago it was our good fortune to come to reside in Victoria county. During that period our energies have been directed towards the upbuilding of the town and the development of the county.

This having been a great lumbering centre it was but natural that with the decay of that industry the population would decrease, the hardy woodsmen removing farther away to be near the scenes of their operations.

Among our agitations have been the erection of a new high school or collegiate institute, the erection of a new post office, the centering here of the Grand Trunk railway shops for this district, the deepening of the channel of the Scugog river in Lindsay, the formation of a board of trade, the construction of a branch to the Canadian Pacific railway, the development of the minerals of the district, the completion of the Fenelon Falls canal and bridge, the extension of the Haliburton railway to Mattawa, the building of a railway up the Gull river valley beyoud Minden, another from here to Sudbury and one to Ottawa via Georgian Bay, the improving of the leading roads to Mariposa, Eldon, Fenelon, Verulam, Emily, Manvers and Cartwright, the development of dairying and ranching in this county, the making of Victoria's beautiful inland waters charming summer resorts, besides numerous other questions and matters of more or less interest.

The collegiate institute is now one of Lindsay's chief industries. Thanks chiefly to Hon. John Dobson, the post office, customs and inland revenue offices are stablished facts. The Grand Trunk chops are here and with them as fine a loo of citizens as ever blessed any town. 
