Honors for Canadian Volunteers. — Victoria County again in it. During the past session we drew the attention of the Governsession we drew the attention of the Government to the decoration of the Imperal Government, and suggested that such be obtained for the Canadian Mintia. That success has crowned our suggestion is gratifying. It is currently reported that a notification has been received at Ottawa of the intention of the Imperial Government to extend to Canada. and presumably to all the colonies of the empire, the volunteer officer's decoration instituted in July last for long and meritorious service in the volunteer force. The decoration is very handsome in design, resembling in some respects the third class of the Bath. It consists of an oak wreath in silver tied at the sides with gold, having in centre the royal cipher "V.R." and crown in gold. It is to be suspended from the left breast by a green ribbon of one inch and a half in width from a silver oak bar brooch. Under the regulations prescribed by the royal warrant it is provided that:

crows a commissioned officer and has served 20 years in the volunteer force, is recommended by the commanding officers of the corps in which he has served, and is duly certified by the district military authorities in which the corps is located as having been an efficient and thoroughly capable officer in every way deserving of such recognition by Her Majesty.

It is likewise provided that half of any time during which an officer may have served in the ranks of the force shall reckon as qualifying service towards the required 20 years. The names of those officers in Great Britain upon whom the decoration shall be conferred are to appear in The London Gazette, and a registry thereof will be kept in the Imperal war office, and it is understood the names of Canadian officers so honored will be published in The Canada Gazettes.
