CHANGES AMONG RAILWAY MEN.—During the past week several changes have been made among the railway men of this district. Lindsay loses a couple of highly respected citizens, but other good families take their places. Some of the changes transfer the men back to former situations. Following are the changes:—Ralph Clarke, engineer, leaves the Haliburton and lives in Port Perry; his fireman will be W. McAllister, who was taken off the Whitby and Blackwater run. Mr. Allison, engineer, takes Ralph's place on the Haliburton train; his fireman is to be Arthur Granger from Peterboro; both will live in Haliburton. Mr. James, engineer of Stonville and Midland way freight, takes the Whitby and Blackwater run, and will have as fireman W. Small, with headquarters at Whitby. Mr. A. Hamilton, engineer, and H. Dolby, fireman, of the Port Perry and Whitby mail, will have as fireman the Midland way freight and live in Stonville. Mr. Chas. Pym, fireman, of Haliburton, will again live at and run out of Lindsay. Mr. James Haugh, engineer is transferred from Cobocook to Lindsay, and will run specials. Mr. T. Dayman, engineer, takes Mr. Haugh's place on the Cobocook train, with Tom Price as fireman. Mr. W. Dolby, fireman, leaves Lindsay to run on Peterboro and Lakeside mixed and will live in Peterboro. Mr. John Storey, fireman, leaves Lindsay for Midland, to work on the shunter between Midland and Waukenahe.

..... We regret to learn Mr. Reuben Minna, conductor on No. 4 Midland and Blackwater mail, is on the sick list. We hope to see him on duty again soon. Mr. Fred Russell satisfactorily fills his place for the time being.

HONORS FOR CANADIAN VOLUNTEERS.—Victoria County again is in. During the past session we drew the attention of the Government to the decoration of the Imperial Government, and suggested that such be obtained for the Canadian Militia. That suggestion has been received at Ottawa of the intention of the Imperial Government to extend to Canada, and presumably to all the colonies of the empire, the volunteer officer's decoration. It is in July last for long and meritorious service in the volunteer force. The decoration is very handsome in design, resembling in some respects the third class of the Bath. It consists of an oak wreath in silver tied at the sides with gold, having in centre the royal cypher "V.R." and crown in gold. It is to be suspended from the left breast by a green ribbon of one inch and a half in width, and silver oak leaf brooch. Under the regulations prescribed by the royal warrant it is provided that:

No person shall be eligible for this decoration, nor be nominated therefor, unless he is or was a commissioned officer and has served 20 years in the volunteer force, is recommended by the commanding officers of the corps in which he has served, and is duly certified by the district military authorities in which the corps is located as having been an efficient and thoroughly capable officer in every way deserving of such recognition by Her Majesty.

It is likewise provided that half of any time during which an officer may have served in the ranks of the force shall reckon as qualifying service towards the required 20 years. The names of those officers in Great Britain upon whom the decoration shall be conferred are to appear in The London Gazette, and a registry thereof will be kept in the imperial war office, and it is understood that the names of Canadian officers so honored will be published in The Canada Gazette. The concluding clause reads:

In order to make such additional provisions as shall effectually preserve pure this most honorable distinction it is ordained that if any person on whom it shall be conferred be convicted of any act derogatory to his honor as an officer and gentleman his name shall forthwith be erased from the registry, and his name shall be removed from the list of those upon whom the said decoration shall have been conferred by order of us, under our royal sign manual, and a notification thereof shall be duly published in The London Gazette.

Quite a number of Canadian officers will be eligible for the decoration. In the 46th Battalion there will be Col. Oulst, Col. Deacon, Major John Hedges, Capt. James Hedges, Capt. Hunter and Capt. Wallace.

Thirty six tenders in all were received by the department. The Hudson Bay Company has been successful in securing the contracts for supplying bacon. Heretofore American bacon principally has been used as Canadian cured bacon has been found to be equal to the American cured, both as regards keeping properties and quality, the contract has been let on the understanding that long clear Canadian cured bacon is to be supplied.

Last year, largely on his energetic representations, the Department called for a portion of the supplies of bacon for the Indians to be Canadian cured. This was found to be of such a satisfactory character that this year Hon.
