### ONE MAN'S DAILY BEER.

It consists of Forty Glasses of Various Brands Methodically Mixed.  
The thirstiest man has been found in San Francisco. He's a mystery, but he's not a drunkard. This frequenter of a well-known Bohemian resort on Bush street is a tall, fine-looking man, about 35 years of age, fully 6 feet 3 inches in height, straight as an arrow, and remarkably well built. His light, clear complexion does not indicate the heavy drinker, but his capacity for beer is enormous.  
He always enters the saloon at the same hour every evening, and on his appearance all eyes are turned on him, though he stands at the bar seeming to avoid everybody's gaze and speaking to no one, leaving as soon as he is through. The waiters never ask "The Mystery" what he will have. The barkeeper picks up three beer glasses of ordinary size and draws one Schlitz, one Weiss and one Culmbach. Sometimes he crosses to the California Hotel, and again he walks down Kearney street and drinks three more glasses in exactly the same manner, and with the same satisfaction, never varying the performance in the slightest degree.  
He repeats the performance every few minutes from then on until exactly midnight, when he drinks his last three glasses for the night and strikes out after his forty-fourth glass of beer with as steady and elastic step as when he entered the place.  
The waiters apparently do not know who or what he is, except that he is a good customer.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

### The Great Wall of China.

The scenery from the great wall is very fine. The wall is here a dividing line between the high, rugged hills of China, and the great sandy plains of Mongolia on the other, with dim mountain summits beyond in the far distance. Over these barren, rocky spurs and scullies, ascending to the very summit, wind zigzags, its serried battlements clear-cut against the sky on the top, to appear again rising on the other side, and a curb of massive stone and brick runs on and on until lost to sight behind the farthest range. And so it goes for miles and miles, eastward to the Pechili Gulf, and westward, mostly in two great rambling lines, along the border of the Gobi desert and Kansu, until it ends among the foothills of the Nan Shan range. However we may regard it, whether as a grand conception for the defence of an empire, as an engineering feat, or merely as a result of the persistent application of human labor, it is a stupendous work. No achievement of the present time compares with it in magnitude. But it has outlived usefulness. The powerful Tartar and Mongol hordes, whose sudden raids and invasions it was built to resist, are no more to be found. The great Gobi and the Kublai could not lead their people to a gory conquest which they did centuries ago. The Chinese civilization has endured, while the once conquering Mongols, the people who in their brightest days established an empire that stretched from the Black Sea to the China Coast, and a court at Peking of such luxury and splendor as Marco Polo described, are now doomed to pass away, leaving nothing behind them but the traditions and records and ruins of a brilliant past.—January Century.
