THE WESTERN PENINSULAR OF ONTARIO. The chairman, on behalf of the members, offered to Mr. W. Nethersole, a hearty welcome on his return from Canada, and stated that he had kindly consented to give them an account of his ex-

periences there (hear, hear). Mr. Nethersole, in his opening re-marks, explained the vast extent of Canada and said that even the province of Ontario alone was 8,000 square miles larger than the United Kingdom. The Peninsular of Western Ontario, which he had thoroughly inspected and of which he desired to speak, was two thirds the size of the United Kingdom, and was truly the "Garden of Ontario." He would never have helieved that there was would never have believed that there was such a piece of country in the world outside of England. It was undoubtedly the side of England. It was undoubtedly the finest and the richest agricultural country in America. The climate was pleasant all the year round and it was advantageously situated with regard to the markets. It was only 3,200 miles from England, while British Columbia was 6,000 and Columbia to North West England, while British Columbia was 6,000 and Oalgary in the North West 5,096. Mr. Nethersole went on to give an impressive warning to his hearers not to settle in Manitoba, which, he said, was an out of the way place and subject to severe climatic influences. The summer frosts there frequently destroyed the crops and he was informed that should such a catastrophe happen this year many of the farmers would be ruined. At the present time, however, they had every prospect of a big crop. The land there was owned by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company and the Dominton Government. Tempting inducements were held out to men with capital to settle there, and in numerous cases after they had provided a farmhouse and buildings and






