PREBETRY OF LINDSAY.—The presbytery of Lindsay met at Sunderland on Tuesday the 15th inst. Fair attendance of ministers and elders.

Rev. W. G. Hanna acted as moderator pro tem. The minutes of last meeting held at Kirkfield were read and sustained. Commissions were received from sessions in favor of the following as representative elders, viz: D. Cameron, Beaverton; John Campbell, Kinross; James Forrest, Uxbridge; Alexander Leask, Wick; and Alexander McTaggart, Sonya.

Rev. A. N. Campbell was appointed moderator for the ensuing year, but in his absence Mr. Hanna was continued in the chair for this meeting. It was moved by Rev. J. McMillan, and duly seconded and carried, that the presbytery express its appreciation of the faithfulness, courtesy and ability with which the retiring moderator, the Rev. M. McKinnon, presided over the meetings of this court during the past year.

Mr. McKinnon, presided over the meetings of this court during the past year, while visiting his native home in Prince Edward Island, desires to express his deep sympathy with him and Mrs. McKinnon, united in thanking to Almighty God for the preservation of his life, and join in the hope that he may soon be enabled to return to his home and labours in which he has been so signally blessed in the past. In the absence of the convener in finances and statistics that report was read by Mr. McLeod. Moved by Rev. D. J. Ross, and duly seconded and carried, that the presbytery endorse the resolution of the Sabbath school association regarding Normal Institutes, and promise financial support in the event of one or two such institutes being held within the presbytery during the year. Rev. W. G. Hanna gave in a very interesting report on home missions. Rev. J. McMillan taking the chair meantime. Routine business was transacted in connection with this matter, and the presbytery adjourned to meet again at 2 p.m. in the afternoon Mr. Sam McLean of Bolover was duly certified to the senate of the presbytery college Montreal, as a fit and proper person to study for the ministry. Mr. William McKay, student supplying Sunday and Oakwood, delivered a discourse which was highly recommended. It was agreed to certify him to the senate of Knox college for the continuance of his course of study. The following committee on statistics and finances was appointed.—A. U. Campbell, convr.; J. C. Gilchrist, and P. A. McLeod. The following were appointed a committee to prepare a programme for the proposed conference on the state of religion at the October meeting of presbytery, viz:—E. A. McLaughlin, convr.; D. McDonald, D. J. Ross and John Campbell elder, Woodville. Moved by Rev. J. McMillan seconded by Rev. A. McLaughlin and carried, that the item "reports from absentees" be on all future dockets of business at the regular meetings of presbytery. The following are the conveners of standing committees.—State of religion, A. McLaughlin; Sabbath schools, P. McLeod; Temperance, D. J. Ross; Sabbath observance, M. N. Bethune; Supp. of students, R. Johnston; System, benef. D. D. McDonald; Sin and stnk., A. U. Campbell; Home missions, W. G. Hanna; Foreign missions, M. McKinnon; French evang., J. McMillan; A. and I. ministers, R. Johnston; W. and O. fund, H. Currie; colleges, A. E. Nelly; results, D. J. Ross. Next meeting was appointed to be held at Cannington on Tuesday the 17th Oct. next at 11 a.m. A presbyterial conference on the evening of the same day to which the public are cordially invited. P. A. McLeod, Clerk pro tem.

TOWN COUNCIL.

MONDAY, August 21st, Present, the Mayor and a full council.

The following communications were read: From Harry McNeill, asking for a side walk to the house he has built on Colborne street. S. and B. committee.

From John T. Mander, asking for a better room to be let in the hotel room to be let from a hotel in compliance with the by-law. Finance committee.

From Fremont Orandell, in regard to wood he proposed to supply, also accounts from Geo. Little and Geo. E. Smith, and one from the Parkin lumber company, stating the amount of stone they had taken off the street, all of which were referred to the finance committee.

Deputy-revee Crandell enquired of the chairman of the street and bridge committee in regard to the stone taken off the streets, the answer not being satisfactory to the worthy deputy-revee he requested that he be informed from the stone taking into the manner in which the tenders that had been received for laying side walks had been opened, hinting that the chairman, Mr. Touchburn, had not dealt fairly in the matter. Mr. Touchburn in reply explained how he had acted, the members of the committee were aware that they were to meet on Saturday evening to open the bids, but he had been with the exception of Mr. Lovell to attend, he in the presence of that gentleman under advice of the Mayor opened the tenders and awarded the contract to the lowest tenderer. In regard to the situation that he had tampered with the tenders he requested the clerk to read a declaration made by John Reynolds, the party who tendered, which stated that he, Reynolds, made the change before he left the tender in the clerk's office. Deputy-revee Crandell again struck in, followed by Messrs. Mallon and Killaly, when a worthy war ensued, in which to put it mildly, language unbecoming gentlemen was used. The Mayor ordered the debate by rebuking those members who had made the insinuations they had, stating that the declaration was prepared at his request in consequence of the fact that he must have been done on Saturday night or Sunday, as Mr. Geo. Matthews was in the house on Saturday and things were not as he left them.

Mr. Killaly, chairman of the police committee, read the report of that committee, recommending that the chief constable be suspended for one month for being absent without leave, and that the report of the chief constable for the months of June and July had been examined and found correct. Report adopted.

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
