the teacher. Too many adhere to the old plan, and, not alone in country public schools but even in pretentious collegiate institutes, constitute themselves simple hearers of lessons, not teachers. "Take the next five sums for to-morrow" is not confined alone to the rural schools. Then when "to-morrow" arrives the question "How many cannot get the answers?" is gravely propounded, and if any fail the teacher probably scolds, or mumbles over a summary of the solution, heard only in the front benches, and "five more sums" are given out for next lesson.

In composition, literature and in almost every subject very little teaching is done. The students are told to write an essay, or are given a long examination paper to answer. 
