THE ANTHRAX BACILLUS.

A Discovery Showing the Desirability Cremating Diseased Sheep.

There is perhaps no micro-organism that has been so exhaustively studied as the bacillus of anthrax, which produces a fatal fever among sheep. A committee of the English Royal Society has recently made a discovery concerning this bacillus which points to the fact that it may live in mud as well as in water. It seems that an epidemic of the anthrax fever broke out among some sheep on a farm in the south of Russia. The water of the well which supplied the sheep was bacteriologically examined, but no bacilli were discovered. An investigation of the mud at the bottom of the well, however, revealed the presence of an organism which, on innoculation into animals, was proved beyond doubt to be the anthrax bacillus. On the well being closed no further cases of the fever occurred. 
