MUST PROVIDE FOR YOUR FAMILY.—Walter Impey, a Woodstock painter, was sent up for trial on Friday on a churge of neglecting to provide the necessaries of life for his children. This was the first prosecution in Woodstock under the new Deminion criminal code and is of interest, as showing the change in the law. Under the new code (section 100) any parent or guardian who fails to provide his wife or children under sixteen years of age with necessaries of life, is liable to imprisonment for three years in the penitentiary. Under the old act a father was liable to imprisonment should he fail to provide "tood. clothing and lodging".
