

Mr. Lamb married Catharine Gibson in 1849, and come to Omemee in 1852 where he comthene d the talking custoess for himself in a small way, which business be continued till the day of his death, gradually extending it until it reached a comparatively large siz . and which was attained by houses desling in the leading leather markets of O stario and Quebec, where he was long and favorably known by the excellence of his product. 
