bottle from which a New York man offering me a drink, and, though not an expert, I could tell enough of it. He said one should not take a British bottle cost him a dollar. Very few Americans can drink their own make of whiskey, Canadian, Irish and Scotch whiskey being taken at 25 cents. But few can stand 25 cent drinks, and as for me, such as is used in Canada is 100 proof and better, larger is also about the only beverage seen any person drinking. The bartender goes through the formality of asking what will you have, but he knows well enough.

I feel sure there cannot be less than 15,000 or 20,000 saloons in Chicago, and from this one can form an idea how much money is wasted on lager. We went north across the river one night to see the Saunders boys and Wm. Hooper, and on the way back one of our party counted the beer dives on one side of the street. We had eight blocks to walk and found 49 saloons. One of the streets was the state building and had none. But counting it in the eight blocks stretched a distance of about 2,500 feet, so it will be seen that on one side of Clark St. there is a saloon for about every sixty feet. In some cases there is one on the ground floor and one down lower, but as a general thing they are all in the basement.

We went in one of these beer tunnels, and found perhaps one hundred there, male and female, drinking and talking quietly, for the lager seems to cause no unnatural elevation of spirits. There is no coronal over it at all. They sit around tables and soak away for hours without the slightest apparent change in their physical or mental condition. The beer habit pervades both sexes, in fact the American women are taking to liquor faster than any other of the women's rights we hear so much about. I don't think any ladies who have the slightest regard for their characters go into the beer tunnels along the streets of the city, but they drink at home I am told. About 100 is an opinion that women have as much right to coronate as men, but those who are not abandoned have a little more respect for themselves than the majority of men. I fancy, however, judging from the amount of female drinking one reads of in the American society journals that both sexes will strike a level soon, and of course the habit will have to cross the line into Canada.

So far as I could see lager beer was the only alcoholic drink sold in the world's fair grounds, but it could be had in hundreds of places, and it was hard to get standing room in any of the places at any time. The people are awfully fond of lager, and spend so much money buying it that I shall not undertake to compute figures. Suffice it to say on this point that the Pabst Brewing Co. of Milwaukee, on exhibition which covered about ten feet square and the gold (24 karat) for which cost \$75,000 before the designer commenced to work it out. Another brewer had for his exhibit a circular platform which turned round and round, and on it were two kings and queens and about twenty courtiers dressed better than were the models in the Parisian exhibit in the manufacturers' building. I may mention that beer and all other liquors are classified among the agricultural exhibit.

THE STOCK YARDS. We took a day to visit the board of trade and stock yards. In the morning we visited the former, and witnessed a scene which one could never forget. Such a gang of madmen howling and pulling is enough to turn one's head, and none but members are allowed in the business hall. The excitement they create there is bewildering, and two days after we were in a man in the same gallery fired his revolver among the scrambling traders in the pit. A pit, as they call it, consists of a circular shaped cavity in the floor about three feet deep and about thirty feet in diameter. From the bottom of the pit, the bottom from all sides. None but young men, though men dare venture into these pits, lest they might get hurt in the fracas. I am not familiar enough with the procedure to describe it, but I can tell you that one class of brokers would try to put one down the stairs, and another would hold him up and offer to buy at a good figure. They would try to sell all they had to him instantly, and would nearly trample him down. These are called "bulls" and "bears" and are the most mobbish in their nature. The bulls would mob him and the bears would mob him. All the operations of this sort of lunatic makes prices for this continent. All the suffer or gain as the case may be by their nefarious gambling. From there we went to the great stock yards, which are the largest in the world. Some idea of their extent may be gathered from the fact that when you are in the middle of the yards you cannot see anything of the sky on any side, except buildings and the smoky distance. There are about 60 feet high, and each about 60 feet wide. Here and there are large or small lots of cattle, sheep or hogs, in some only one, in others a hundred. Buyers on horseback go through these lots purchasing for the killing houses, daily for the city company alone they have to buy daily 5000 hogs, 5000 sheep and lambs and 4000 cattle. This makes 14,000 head a day in one packing house. We could not visit every slaughtering firm, so of course we selected Armour's to run through. A guide was furnished as soon as we went to the head office, and we first went where they kill pigs. The urine are driven in to droves and crowded up into a stall about 6 feet square where a man stands and hooks a clap on the hind leg of each animal. This is jerked up and swung along past a fellow who takes hold of a foreleg in his hand and strikes it with a knife he holds in the other. 539 Entries, 490 Awards. CANADA'S RECORD FOR CHEESE AT THE WORLD'S FAIR. SOUTH PARK, CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 18.—Earl Aberdeen and suite, accompanied by Commissioners Averee, Cochrane, Larke, Law, Perley, Tasse and Watson, completed inspection of Canadian exhibits this afternoon.

103 TO CANADA, NONE TO U.S. Results of the fine cheese competition at the World's Fair are published to-night and are of startling significance to all interested in the dairy industry of the Dominion. The cheese was judged by two United States and one Canadian judge. In the cheddar class Canada won 103 awards out of 1898, Canada won 103 awards out of 1898, Canada won 103 awards out of 1898.

AWARDS BY PROVINCES. Ontario had 275 exhibits of cheese of 1898 and won 180 awards. Erie won 99 points out of a possible 100 for perfection. Quebec had 113 exhibits of cheese and won 105 awards. Nova Scotia had 10 exhibits and secured 3 awards. New Brunswick had 4 exhibits and obtained 2 awards. Prince Edward Island had 19 exhibits and took 8 awards. Manitoba had 4 exhibits and received 3 awards.

991 POINTS OF A POSSIBLE 1000. The total number of exhibits of cheese from Canada was 539, which secured altogether 480 awards. Nine of the exhibits from Canada secured 99 1/2 points out of a possible 100. Five of these lots were from Ontario and five from Quebec.

TESTING THE MAMMOTH CHEESE. The mammoth cheese of 23,000 pounds was tested by the judges and the following is the commendation they make: "We, the undersigned judges of cheese at the World's Columbian Exposition in October, 1893, certify that this day we examined the mammoth cheese from Canada, in the agricultural building, by boring into it to a depth of 33 inches. We report that the cheese is sound from the rind to the center, that it draws perfectly solid and of the close in the texture. It has a good clean flavor, which is quite tasty. In our opinion it has kept its flavor remarkably well. We found the color uniform and true; the workmanship of the making is most creditable. We attach a score card, which shows 95 points out of a possible score of 100 points out of a possible score of 100 points, and recommend that a medal and diploma be awarded to the Dairy Commissioner for Canada, being informed of the conditions under which the mammoth cheese was made in a building built during the summer in a building with a glass roof, where the temperature was often stood over 90, a wonder and a surprise to us all. "A Trip to the World's Fair."

Brother Graham of the Whitty Chronicle was a visitor at the World's Fair. He promised his readers to describe the sights—good, bad and indifferent—as he saw them, which was something unusual to do. Last week we gave his impression of the trip going there, this week deals with his first sights in Chicago.

A CHICAGO SUNDAY. The day after we arrived was Sunday, but we noticed through the window that it did not affect business on our street, Clark St. Across the way every shop-keeper had his wares displayed, and further investigation showed that the saloons, ticket scalpers, pawnbrokers, etc., were busy as nailers.

We effected a compromise in our mind between going to church on the one hand and the races and baseball matches on the other, and went to Lincoln park in the forenoon and Washington park in the afternoon. They have so much waste territory around Chicago that the parks may be made whatever size they choose to name. To give an idea how much waste land there is about that city, I may say that for an hour and a half before the yonkster Chicago the train runs through a great morass, without a sign of civilization except the railway itself. The city's parks are many miles each in size, and have been made magnificently and wonderfully beautiful at great expense. 300,000 people would not crowd Lincoln park at all. We found the theatres, play houses, gambling houses, etc., in full blast, and noticed by the Sunday papers that when a new play comes to town it always opens to the great day for recreation and enjoyment. I had secured cards to hear Rev. Jno. McNeill, the great Scottish divine, but could not get there in time, so we went to a theatre and witnessed about as infamous and depraved an exhibition as I could imagine. Every one of our party was utterly disgusted, and some were bound to go out before it was half through, but this would be difficult to accomplish, so we sat it out, and then they tried to induce us to attend a free show upon which were said the performers were not hampered by even tightness. We drew the line at what had already been furnished for our money. On the drop curtain of this theatre were signs urging patrons of the play to visit places on 4th Avenue, a street which throughout the union is a byword of immorality.

During Sunday the boats ran excursions, the baseball clubs played double games, an extra card was put on at the Chicago race parks, and probably 10,000 people went fishing along the lakefronts, where the catch must be good, judging by the number of Walton's disciples who take to the boat and line every day.

It is unnecessary to say that all cross-country and street railways run as fast as possible on Sundays. Although personally opposed to Sunday service on street railways as having a very doubtful tendency, we rode to Lincoln park and back without apparently bankrupting our morals, and so many others incurred the same risk that we had hard work to find standing places in the cars, not one of our party of four being able to obtain seats in any street car during the day.

THE BEEB HART. Immediately one steps on the Chicago pavement he is confronted with beer signs on all sides.
