

Landy, inspector-general of the frontier police, with 26 men and several officers of the first battalion of a West Indian regiment, who were engaged in an expedition against the Sotas, have been killed, and it is added that they were shot by French troops.

It is also reported that a French officer engaged in the attack was captured.

The twenty-six privates who were shot were all negroes. The Government despatches are withheld, and only part of their contents can be ascertained. According to all accounts, the French opened fire upon the British without provocation or warning. How they could have made such a mistake is yery difficult to conceive, as the West India regiment wore bright scarlet uniforms, carry British arms, and observe all the regulations of army discipline. At daylight on December 28rd they were attacked by the French force, consisting of thirty Sengalese sharp shooters and one thousand two hundred natives, who were headed by Lieutenant Maritz,

THE FRENCH WERE BEATEN. When they were fired upon, the British at once responded, and the French shortly afterwards retired. Lieut. Maritz was wounded and captured by the British.

THE FRENCH OFFICER'S EXPLANATION. He was questioned by his captors as to his reasons for attacking them, and explained that the British troops, who were blacks, were members of the Sofas tribes, and their European officers who were deeply tanned by the African sun, looked

Lieut, Moritz died from the effects of BRITISH LOSS NOT SO HEAVY AS REPORTED.

The British loss was less than was at first reported; only six of the privates were killed.
