Wm. SIDNEY. Town Council. The council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members being present, a number of communications were read which were referred to the several committees to which they belong.

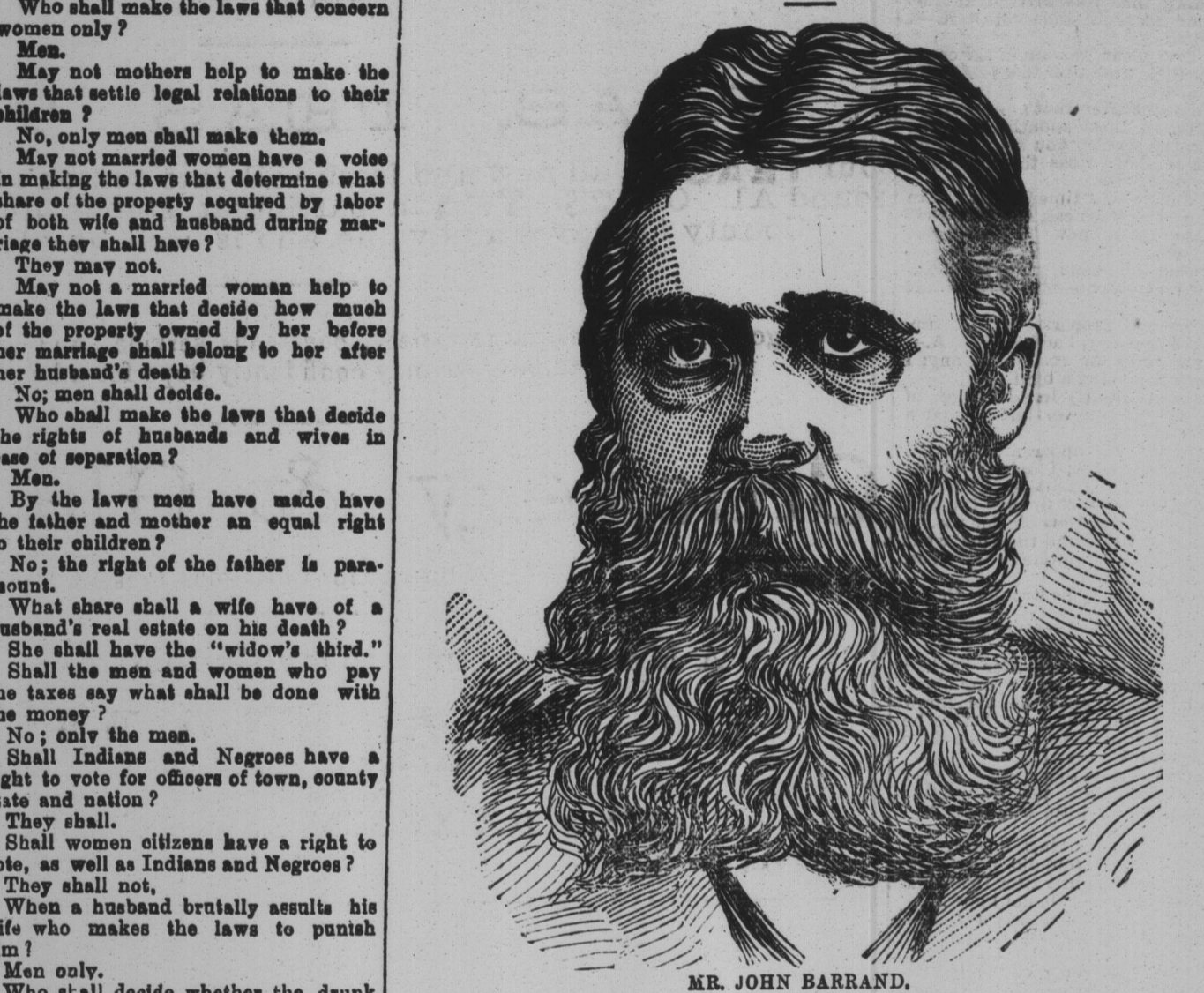
Messrs McIntyre and Connelly addressed the council on behalf of the central charity committee. Subsequently a motion was passed granting them of \$125 to the committee.

Report of special committee re water works read recommending that the board of trade be requested to call a special meeting to consider and report upon the purchase of the works. That a public meeting of the ratepayers be called on Tuesday 23rd inst to consider the matter and that the clerk give the necessary notice of the intention of the town to apply for legislation to purchase said works.

Report adopted. Motion referring a communication from Mr. Thompkins, in regard to dumping garbage, to the board of health, one in regard to complaints regarding the removal of the snow of the sidewalks; and one appointing the Mayor chairman of town property committee; Mr. Keith and the treasurer a committee to deal with the time for the collection of taxes on February 19th, and one authorizing the Mayor to appoint Mr. F. L. Somerville, civil engineer, valuator re improvements made to the old opera house and market. Two by-laws, one to appoint a board of health, and one to appoint a high school trustee were read a first time, after which the council adjourned.

The Buffalo Tribune puts its views on the one-half franchise question in this shape:— Question: Shall men and women who obey the laws have a right to make them? Answer: No, men only. Who shall make the laws that concern women only? Men. May not mothers help to make the laws that settle legal relations to their children? No, only men shall make them. May not married women have a voice in making the laws that determine what share of the property acquired by labor of both wife and husband during marriage they shall have? They may not. May not a married woman help to make the laws that decide how much of the property owned by her before her marriage shall belong to her after her husband's death? No; men shall decide. Who shall make the laws that decide the rights of husbands and wives in case of separation? Men. By the laws men have made have the father and mother an equal right to their children? No; the right of the father is paramount. What share shall a wife have of a husband's real estate on his death? She shall have the "widow's third." Shall the men and women who pay the taxes say what shall be done with the money? No; only the men. Shall Indians and Negroes have a right to vote for officers of town, county state and nation? They shall. Shall women citizens have a right to vote as well as Indians and Negroes? They shall not. When a husband brutally assaults his wife who makes the laws to punish him? Men only. Who shall decide whether the drunk shop shall be opened on the door to the home—the women's territory? Men only.

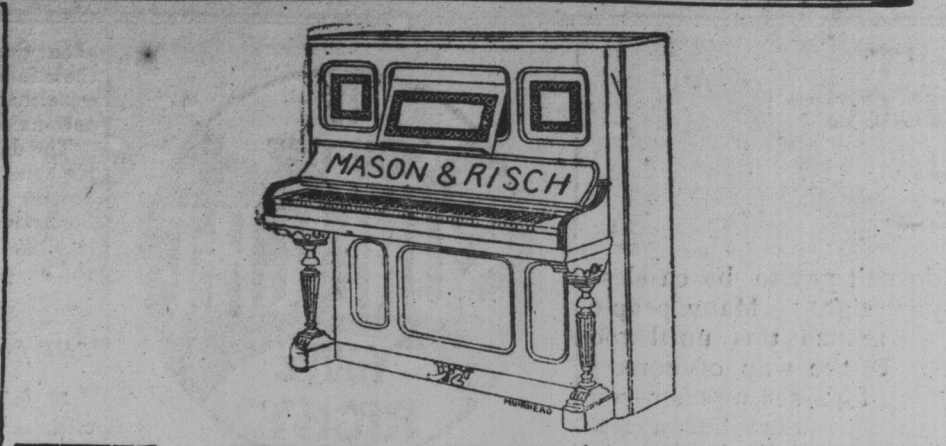
