

Geology of Victoria, Haliburtons Peterborough and Hastings.

Report of Dr Frank Adams M Ap. Sc. Professor in McGill University The present report contains a brief summary of the results of a preliminary geological examination of that portion of the Ontario comprised in sheet 118 of the Ontario series of geological maps on a scale of four mile to one inch, now in course of preparation, together with the results of an examination of certain mineral deposits to which attention has recently been attracted, and which lie to the south of the above mentioned sheet in the townships of Dalton, Digby, Lutterworth, Somerville and Galway. This preliminary examination was made in order to ascertain the general geological structure of the district in question, thus laying a basis for its detailed mapping and study which it is hoped will be commenced next summer.

In the north-western portion of the area on the other hand our explorations have so far failed to discover explorations have so far falled to discover any crystalline, the country being apparently occupied by gneiss alone. As townships in which this crystalline limestone is especially abundant, Lutterworth, Minden, Snowdon, Dysart, Glamorgan, Monmouth, Cardiff and Brudnell may be mentioned, as well as the township of Galway lying to the south of the area embraced in sheet 118.
