

How they do it in U.S.

Washington, March 6.—Supreme court of the United States, in a majority opinion yesterday, affirmed the constitutionality of the New York law, providing for the summary destruction of nets and seizes seized for unlawful use. Fishing in certain parts of Lake Ontario, otherwise than by rod and line, was prehibited. In the case at bar, the game and f.h protector of the state seized and destroyed

fifteen nets found in the lake.

Suit was brought to determine the constitutionality of the law. The court of first instance decided that the law was unconstitutional, but the supreme court, in general term, and the court of appeals, decided in faver of the law. This judgment was affirmed in a decision read by Justice Brown, but Chief Justice Fuller and Justice Field and Brewer dissented asserting that legislation which authorized the destruction of propert without judicial process was unconstit
