

Ontario Government Timber Dues.

SUNDAY, March 14th, 1894.

DEAR Sir,—Kindly allow me space in your valuable columns to express the sentiments of the ratepayers of far away Dalton and adjoining townships. These townships still possess a few straggling pine, suitable only for small square timber for barns, sheds and shingles; too small for shingles, too much handling for saw logs, as it would take probably 15 or 20 of them to make a thousand feet. Now sir, what we want and what is actually necessary for the improvement of our townships is: That the license on these government lands be cancelled and the timber reserved for the use of the settler, let whoever wants to build a barn, stable, shed or any other out house for the improvement and convenience of his farm, go to the crown land agent with the "bill of stuff" he requires—get a permit and pay for it at a fair price, as such and every one of us would be only too glad to do and in that way save us from paying double dues, as we would have to should we happen to take a stick at the present time?

We do not expect any leniency from the present government, as their policy seems to be the same in the present as it has been in the past viz., to crush the settler, and right here let me say that I have seen saw logs cut and skidded by the settler in the actual process of clearing his land, taken from before his eyes, and all the satisfaction he could obtain was the snap of the finger and "help yourself if you can," and now to conclude if you can find a man who heartily endorses our views, send him along and he will get the unanimous vote of these townships. In fact, from what we hear that man is already been chosen in the person of Mr. B. Bryans, if so let him come and receive the hearty grip of the back woodsman. 
