Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario East From Ottawa Evening Journal, March 21st. The Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario East which is now in session in Orange hall, Albert street, is the most representative and best attended annual gathering of this branch of the order that has yet been held. There are in all more than two hundred delegates in attendance and those by their enthusiasm manifest that Orangeism is not on the decline in Eastern Ontario. The business of the session was opened yesterday afternoon by the presentation of reports. The first report presented was that of the Grand Master J. B. Delemars of Minden. The report stated that there had been an ever increasing prosperity of the order not only in the Dominion but everywhere throughout the world. Deep regret was expressed at the death of Bro. Van Ingen, who for almost a quarter of a century had discharged his duties of grand secretary with every satisfaction. A marked increase was reported in the membership of the order within the jurisdiction as well as in the value of lodge properties. AS TO HOME RULE. In referring to the Home Rule question the report said that should the dismemberment of the Empire occur there would "truly be dark days in store for the British Empire and her greatness and boasted liberty would soon be at an end." "Brighter days," it was hoped, will show themselves in the near future for the brethren in Ireland who throughout the trying scenes of the past have shown themselves true Orangemen and noble Britons, whose devotion for allegiance to the Protestant throne of Great Britain is unswerving and who are prepared to stake their lives and property in support of "The Altar and Throne." The question of Separate schools in Manitoba so far is settled in favor of British authority and Protestant contentions that illimitable Northwest has its future in its own hands in this question, and our brethren who have sought home in the great prairie sea, will take good care that no restrictions of their inalienable rights shall prevail or that any portion of the public money shall be expended in the support of denominational schools. We therefore congratulate our friends in Manitoba and the Northwest on the successful attainment of the privilege they enjoy of abolishing separate schools. EXEMPTION OF CHURCH PROPERTY. The report also dealt with the question of the taxation of church property. Whatever might be said in defence of exemption from taxation of edifices used exclusively for public worship there could be no honest argument addressed on behalf of the exemption of a vast amount of property now exempted from liability to taxation under the caption "For Religious purposes." Denominationalism should have no special advantage from governments, as such, over Canadian soil. Taxation for municipal and public needs should be levied alike on all property and no class or creed should have any right to claim exemption therefrom for denominational purposes.

Mr. HOWELL'S LONG ORANGE CAREER. Recognition was made in the report of the long and useful career of Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, past grand master and sovereign of the Orange order in British America and the hope was expressed that he should be long spared to continue a life of usefulness and earn the high position to which he has attained in the service of his country. Reference was also made to the manly, straightforward and unequivocal position taken by most Worshipful Grand Masters and Sovereigns of the Orange Order in Canada, and the Honorable Mr. Clarke Wallace in parliament when attacked for the assertion of his anti-Home Rule and Protestant opinions. "Thank God," read the report, "Canada is a country where free speech is accorded to every one and the stand taken by Bro. Wallace on his undoubted rights has intensified his claim upon the hearts of his brethren and strengthened their confidence in his noble conduct." In conclusion the report urged the members to remain firm to the principles of the order and in their loyalty to the British crown. SOME STATISTICS. The report of the grand secretary, Mr. F. M. Clarke of Belleville was also presented. The number of lodges in this jurisdiction, he stated, had within the past year increased from 321 to 368 and the total membership was now 11,776 or an increase of more than a thousand during the year. The total valuation of lodge property in Ontario East was \$93,415, an increase of \$7,000 since last year. The Orange Benefit society in affiliation with the Grand Lodge had done much good work.
