The Situation in the States.

The serious aspect of the present export of gold from the United States has already presented itself. The dulness of business in the country forbids the employment of foreign capital there, and the movement that is taking place is its consequence. The prevailing conawkward complications. Nearly all the gold taken out of the United States this spring. some \$22,000,000 for April and the first half of May, has been drawn from the treasury. The surplus has been carried down now to less than \$89,000 000, which means during the past two months a loss of over \$22 000 . 000. In the two weeks of May just past over \$8,000,000 have been withdrawn, and all these figures far exceed the exports for the corresponding period last year when the movement created a panic. 
