In politics he was a life-long conservative. He leaves a widow, two sons, John and William Amey, and one daughter, Mrs. J. Darnbrough.

Great Britain's Strength.

Notwithstanding the glorious military history of Great Britain, she is not considered one of the military nations of the world. Her British army of a few years ago, of more than a hundred thousand men, seems infinitely small and not worth considering in comparison with the immense standing armies maintained by the European nations. It would seem an easy matter for France, say, with her millions of men, to land a force on the shores of England, and subdue that country within a week—provided, of course, the fleet were out of the way. But if an invading army were once in that country they would, it is not generally known in Canada, have upwards of a quarter of a million volunteers to face and in addition the militia force of nearly 130,000 men. If to this were added the militia reserve of 80,000 men; 15,000 yeomanry cavalry and 50,000 of the regular army reserve, as well as the thousands upon thousands of retired army officers who have made their home in the British Isles after many years of active service in all parts of the world; the invaders would be apt to find, after landing, that they had stirred up a veritable human hornet's nest. In reckoning the fighting strength of Great Britain one must remember, too, that the British lack the practice that would enable them to surrender gracefully.—Empire.

A Violated Pledge.

The more the matter of deputy-registrar Grundy's dismissal is discussed the worse does it appear for the Ontario government. If Sir Oliver is well-advised he will allow as little time as possible to elapse before securing Mr. Grundy's reinstatement. He may not realize it, but it is just one of those apparently trifling matters which have a strong influence upon public sentiment because they come practically home to the comprehension of the average voter much more clearly than questions of policy.

It is a mere subtlety to say that Grundy was probably or possibly dismissed because of his conduct after his return to Peterboro. Mr. Avey, when assuring him of protection, must have known that his employer was not in the least likely to discharge him ostensibly on the ground of the evidence he gave—that if interfered with at all it would be under some other pretext.

If he simply meant to limit his guarantee of protection to dismissal for the assigned cause that Grundy had given evidence exposing the mismanagement of the office he was simply trifling and abusing the confidence of the country. To offer to discharge him to discharge a subordinate for any such reason.

The talk about the dismissal arising out of the after proceedings is a mere quibble. If the government fail to abide by the guarantee of immunity extended to Grundy, which by any reasonable interpretation must be held to cover all subsequent developments arising out of the investigation, and to do it quite publicly indignation at such double dealing will assuredly make itself felt.—Toronto World.

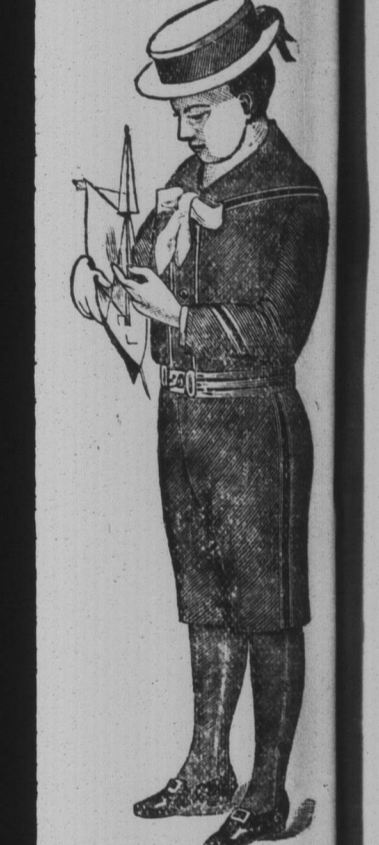
