whom 6,324 are operatives. Of the 2,246 Pullman employes who live on the borders of the town, about 1,000 own their own homes.

The Pullman savings bank has 2,000 tors, and their deposits amount to 632,000, an average per person of \$316.

If all the lumber used annually in Pullman shops alone were delivered on one train, the train would consist of 5,000 ars, and would be 35 miles long.

GENERAL HERBERT'S SPEECH.

"I have a few words to say to you specially. I have just spoken of duty, and of discipline, You have before you inscribed upon the maps of Canada the names of Vaudreuil, of Montcalm, of Laval; and in fact those who in various ways have given proof of that devotion to duty that had been confided them. You have also amongst you those who, in joining them selves to that company justly named the Crusaders of the nineteenth century, performed both a religious and military duty on the battlefields of Montana, of Monte Rotundo, and at the gates of the eternal city. It is for you to go forward and to manifest the military qualities of your race, as well as its hereditary devotion to country."
