This solicitor had been solicitor also for Robertson, but Robertson had no intimation that the money was paid is. On the contrary the solicitor informed him that the Tracys would keep the money for a longer time, if he would reduce the rate of interest, and to this Robertson agreed, without any iresh writings about it. The selligitar continued paying the

The seliciter continued paying the interest yearly to Rebertson, as if he had been receiving it from the Tracys; and it was only on the cellapse of the solicitor that the fraud was discovered. Tracy died a few months after he paid the money to the selicitor. His representatives new centended that Robertson, and not the Tracy estate, should bear the loss, and they set up Rebertson's delay and his course of dealing with the solicitor, as a bar to his right to recover.

In the absence of the local master, the case was referred by consent to Mr. G. H. Hopkins, barrister at Lindsay, who decided in Rebertson's appealed to the chancery division, and an order was made by Mr. Justice Rebertson setting aside Mr. Hopkin's judgment. Finally it reached the court of appeal, with the following result, as reported in the city papers of Saturday. "Scully vs Rebertson.—Judgment on appeal by the defendants from an order of Robertsen J. This "Murder" was an Accident. DETECTIVE MURRAY INVESTIGATES THE PETERBORO MYSTERY-FRANK BEATON

WAS ACCIDENTALLY KILLED BY THE CARS. Chief Government Detective John Murray returned yesterday from Peterboro, where he investigated the alleged murder of Frank Beaton, whose mutilated body was found on Come again.

The result of the detective's investigations explodes the murder theory, and shows that Beaton's death was purely the result of acci-

dent, and supports the theory advanced by The World on Saturday. Beaton, whose mother resides at Belleville, and who has a brother at Peterboro, was not employed by the cook of Whitby's circus people in any capacity, althoug it is possible he may have been following the circus. He was around town until late Thursday

night, and it is supposed started to walk through the railway yards. The dining car of the circus was shunted on the siding and the space between the car and the coal sheds is in some places too narrow to admit of even the passage of a human body. It is thought that Beaton was making his way between the car and the shed when the car started to pull out and he was caught between the two and crushed to death. His body was carried along a considerable distance and then dropped to the ground, his left hand falting across the rails and being severed by the train. The circumstance that no blood flowed from Mr. Bowman, the host of the Tremont, has an idea of fixing the island up for campers, but until there is some assurance of its remaining where it now is, it will hardly be occupied by any tenants.
