CARTWRIGHT TOWNSHIP.

Blackstock, July 6.—On Wednesday Cartwright, the banner township of the old riding of West Durham, which has been the fighting ground of political battles for the past 50 years, has been celebrating the victory won at the late election, when W. H. Reid, the conservative candidate, was elected. This township, which returned the handsome majority of 261 for Mr. Reid, has always upheld the standard of the party here, and accordingly turned out in full force. Mr. Reid arrived in Bowmanville in the forenoon, and about 1 o'clock, accompanied by the Dominion organ band and a number of friends from town, started for Blackstork, 14 miles north All along the road it was easy to tell where a conservative lived, as nearly every such place had flags or other decorations hanging out. At Hampton and again at Enniskillen additions were made to the rocession, which at Burketon was met by the Cartwright contingent, headed by the Enfield band. The entire party was then massed in one grand procession, which was over two miles in length, and proceeded to Blackstock, where an immense throng was in waiting. 
