POISONOUS VACCINE.—A sad case of the fatal results of using impure vaccine is reported from West DePere, Wisconsin. Mr. Neil McDonald, the subject of this pathetic story, was a former resident of the township of Digby in this county. He and his family a few years ago moved to DePere, where they have since been employed in a large paper mill. They were comfortable and contented in their new home until the powers that be issued their decree that certain doctors should proceed at once on a tour of vaccination. The paper mill was visited and Neil McDonald with the other mill employees was operated upon. He took ill in a few days and after weeks of intense suffering, borne with great patience, death came to his relief. Dr. Humphrey of Green Bay, who attended him in his suffering said it was one of the worst cases of vaccination he ever saw, and he had several bad ones; some had to have their arms amputated, and Neil McDonald's was only one that resulted fatally. This sad case should prove a warning to the authorities in connection with their duties in the means to be used in the prevention of disease. May none of our happy Canadian homes be saddened through the negligence of our authorities, and to this end, Mr. Editor, we request the publication of these facts as reported by Miss Marion McDonald in a letter written to her aunt, Mrs. Frank Armstrong of Lindsay, Ontario.
