Trouble for the Railways. Los Angeles, July 17. — A petition in equity was filed in the United States Circuit Court here yesterday, which is of a startling character. The petition is instigated by attorney-General Olney, and is directed against the Southern Pacific Railway Company and 30 other railroad companies, besides many noted railroad companies. companies, besides many noted railroad people. If the suit is successful it will affect every railroad in the United States. It is stated that the effect will be to make every corporation now a part of the Southern Pacific Company operate under a separate management, and make void all monopoly of freight and passenger traffic. The petition is in the name of the United States, and the defendants are charged The petition is in the name of the United States, and the defendants are charged with combining and conspiring together and with other persons and corporations whose names are unknown, to restrain trade and commerce between and among several States of the United States, and between and among States and Territories between and among States and Territories of the United States and foreign countries. The petition questions the corporate existence of the companies affected, and asks them to produce certain contracts and show cause why they should not be appulled.
