Engineer Thos. Hay and party have completed the survey of the waters of the eastern district and are now in the vicinity of Haliburton. In a day or two they will be on the Gull river waters and will take bearings for locks and dams connecting the beautiful lakes of the chain.

THE MANITOBA SCHOOL ACT.

The judicial committee of the Privy Council has given judgment in the appeal of the roman catholics of Manitoba for the right to petition for redress of grievances created by the Manitoba school act of 1890.

The question now presents itself in its most objectionable form; but it is hoped a satisfactory solution of it may be reached without arraying creed against creed.

The points to be considered are: 1. Have the roman catholics any grievances to be redressed? If so, what are they?

2. Manitoba's school act of 1890 having been declared constitutional, and the roman catholics having been adjudged by the Judicial Committee to have suffered no injustice or wrong, and to have been deprived of no right; wherein can the claim for remedial legislation be found?

3. Does the school law of Manitoba recognize protestant and not roman catholic schools? 4. Presuming the Privy Council is correct in deciding the roman catholic minority has the right of appeal for redress of grievances, does it follow that "grievances" exist? If they do not, then how can they be redressed? The right to appeal for redress of grievances surely does not imply that any cause of complaint necessarily exists.

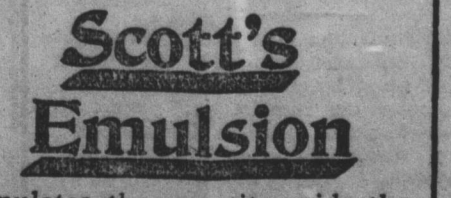
