MISSIONARY SERMONS. - Divine service was conducted in Cambridge street methodist church on Sunday last by Rev. Dr. Ecy, late of Japan. In two cultured and powerful sermons the great problem of the world's evangelization was discussed and the duties arising from the work pressed home upon the consciences of his hearers. In the morning the elequent speaker indicated the three great movements that had attempted to correct the evils of mankind, viz. the philosophical ethics of Plato, Aristotle, Confucius and their ethics of Plato, Aristotle, Confucius and their contemporaries of that great intellectual age 500 years before Christ; the moral obligations of man as revealed to and expounded by Moses; and finally christianity. It was shewn that although the mental power of the average Greek was according to a high su thority as much superior to that of the average man of to-day as ours is to that of the African and although the Greek philosophy was so and although the Greek philosophy was so complete that not a single idea has been added to it since that apart from revela lation yet the best efforts of that age utterly falled in the moral reconstruction of humanity. Likewise the dawn of siving revelation as ex. nibited in the Hebrew system only imperfectly developed the spiritual possibilities that are in man, and hence it is the work of christianity with its "extras" of regenerating and sanctifying operations of the divine spirit to bring about the emancipation of man from his moral disabilities and his restoration to an ideal character of sight-coveness. bis moral dissbirities and his restoration to an ideal character of righteousness. Hence christianity is the universal need of mankind. In the evening the sermon was rich in examples of the progress of christian influence in the orient all of which tended to prove that it is adapted to the men of any part of the globe and justified the command of its founder "Go ye into all the world and disciple all nations,".....On Monday night Dr. Eby lectured to a large audience of the 'Past and present of Japan and the war between that country and China." It was a masterly treatment of a live question by one who knows whereof he speaks through an experience of eighteen years in the Best.
