A Frightful Disaster.
London, Jan. 30.—The North German Lloyd steamship Elbe, bound from Bremen for New York, was sunk in a collision with a small steamer, 50 miles off Lowestoft, early this morning. She carried 380 souls. Only 21 survivors have been landed, but a few others may still be floating in one of the ships small boats. At 10 o'clock this evening the number of lives lost was given out at 350. The survivors of the wreck were landed at Lowestoft by the fishing smack Wildflower at 5 40 o'clock this evening.
