It was a loyal compliment to the grand old party; to Hon. John Haggart, minister of railways and canals, also was the tribute a noble one; and to Sam Hughes, the member for the riding, was it more especially a token of loyalty and approval.

His "little lecture" which he has been forcing on the clergy and Sunday schools of South Victoria has fallen flat also. His agitation among protestants whispered in his own cunning little way over a "catholic premier" proved as futile as does the present one over an "orange premier."

Mr. J. H. Harvey of Coboonk, occupied the chair, and after a short introductory speech called upon Mr. Charles Fairbairn, M.P., for the first speech.

Mr. Fairbairn was well received, and said that he was glad to have the opportunity of being present to do honor to the ministers who were with them, and hoped himself to return to the riding and address the electors again later in the fight.

Major Sam. Hughes, M.P., was then introduced, and received with loud applause. He reviewed his course in parliament, showing that he had, when called upon, never been afraid to cast a vote for the party of progress, the conservative party.

Mr. T. Mayne Daly followed, and with standing the coldness of the weather, which penetrated even to the interior of the hall, the Minister of the Interior seemed in no way disconcerted, and favoured the audience with a splendid speech.

Dr. Montague was then called upon by the chairman, and cordially received. In opening, he paid a warm compliment to Major Hughes, as the representative of North Victoria. The Intercolonial railway was then dealt with, and its present efficient administration compared with past managements.

The meeting broke up shortly before five o'clock with a hearty vote of thanks to the ministers for their attendance, moved by Major Hughes, M.P. Cheers were given for "the Queen," the Ministers and Major Hughes, and the distinguished visitors departed for their respective homes.
