THROUGH NORTH VICTORIA AND HALI-BURTON — Thomas Hay, C. E., with a capable steff has about completed a survey of the lakes and reservoirs along the Guil and Burnt river waters in this district. The levels and areas of the lakes were taken; the facility with which dams can be erected at suitable points, and locke placed between the lakes has been determined, and much useful information

From data obtained it is demonstrated that the residents along the Guil river waters who have so long vainly looked for railway connection, can, at very little cost, have direct steamer service with railway centres such as Lindsay, Foneion Falls. Coboconk, etc., a ong the inland lakes of Victoria. No railway company can be found willing to underske the construction of a road into the district; it would not pay. But the recent survey has demonstrated that a canal is not only

feasible but very simple.

Three locks, one at Cobcoonk, one at Norlaud and one at Elliott's Falls will give direct steamer connection with Minden village. Increase the height of the dam at Coboconk, or if that would fi ed too much ground, erect another near the river entrance to the bay above the present dam, and raise the water in Mud Turtle lakes a ccupie of feet. Then a mail lock at Coboconk and one at the river At Norland one lock would give good pavigation to Eliott's Falls, for the "Natural Dam" is merely a narrow ridge of granite, and

outd easily be blasted out.
At Elliott's Falls a dam and one lock would afford clear navigation to Minden. The dam could easily be raised to increas the height of Moore's lake to the level of Guil take. Then the narrow ridge of rock at M lore's Falls could be blasted out, leaving perfectly clear sailing up the megnificent waters of Guil lake and river to Minden, and Workman's mills.

Thue, three, or at most four, small locks at the three points, Cobocork, Norland and Elitott's Falls, would open up to traffic up wards of thirty miles of country now partially closed to the markets of the world. There would be but three bridges across it, at Nor-land, Moore's Falls and Minden.

Tourists up Gull river remember the rapids at the mouth of Guil river and the strong current shove. They will be surprised to earn that from Minden bridge to the foot of Gull lake there are but seven inches difference in the levels. So also there is scarcely any difference in the levels above Coboconk dam of Piano, Voice

difference in the levels above Coboconk dam and the river below Norland. An inch fall makes a rapid current.

Above Minden the surprise is an great as below it. An increase of a few feet in the dam at Mitchell's bridge or a small dam at Horseshoe bridge will give easy atcamer sailing through Mountain Lake into Twelve Mile, and onward into Little Boskung, Boskung and Beech lakes. An easily constructed lock into Kushog would open up the beautiful into Kushog would open up the beautiful waters of that lake as well as of Sonora. On the other hand a lock into Maple lake would open up a splendid stretch into Pine, Grass,

Cranberry, Eagle, Kenesis, etc.

The rocky ridge at Hogg's bridge between
Mountain and Twelve Mile lakes would be blasted out and the sufface of Mountain lake sieed a couple of teet, or to high water level. It would be a very easy matter to connect
Mountain or Horseshoe lake with Minden or
Guil river. A dam at either Mitchell's bridge Gull river. A dam at either Mitchell's bridge or thorseshoe bridge would cause the water to filw from Mountain lake straight out at the south west corner, dewn an old channel to the Minden river just below Workman's mills. The channel is there already made by nature. A couple of locks in addition to the others named, below the "Big Eddy" would connect Liudsay with Sonors and Maple lakes, and onen up the greatest summer resert district in open up the greatest summer resert district in

Or the narrow steep river bed above Workman's mills could be dammed up and a couple of locks placed in which would affird connection to the upper waters through the Horseshoe lakes intead of directly through

Mountain lake. This would be a great boon to she settlers along those waters. They could then reach markets with their produce, which is now an impossibility in summer, owing to the terribiy sreep hills and bad roads. Their hardwood timber would then prove valuable. The lumberers, Gilmour & Co., Rathbun & Co., Howry & Sons, and others, would find great essistance in the locks in transporting their sesistance in the locks in transporting their steamers, or "alligators" as they are termed. The advantages are so numerous and the cost so trifling that the wonder is the works have not been undertaken before.

In constructing the dams at the named

points necessary for the storing of the waters in the lakes for the main Trent Canal it will be an easy matter to place in a lock where necessary; and the whole cost reduced to almost nothing.

To summarize. The works necessary to give uninterrupted navigation from Lindsay to Sonora lake on the north west and Maple

to Sonora lake on the north west and maple lake on the north east are.

A lock at each Coboconk, Norland, Elliott's Falls, Workman's mill, Buck's into Kushog, and Dawson's into Maple lake.

The "Natural Dam" at Norland, the rocky ledge between Moore's and Gull lakes at Isary's or Moore's Falls, the ledge between Mountain and Twelve Mile lakes at Hogg's bridge would require blasting; and there would be opened up upwards of two hundred miles of shore line now comparatively shut not from markets. out from markets.

out from markets.

The extra cost would be trifling.

Were a railway constructed over the same route it would receive \$3200 per mile. The straight distance opened up would exceed fifey miles. Thus the government would bonus a railway along the same route to the extent of one hundred and sixty thousand doilars. A very small fraction of that sum would complete all the works proposed.

The waters thus to be opened up are;—Mud Turtle lakes to Norland, Moore's and Gult lakes to Minden, Horseshoe lake to Mountain lake, thence to Twelve Mile lake, thence to Little Boskung and onward into Boskung. This lake is the great central reserveir into which pour the waters of Kus hog and Sonora from the north west; of Hall's Hawk, and a score more from the north, and of Beech, Maple Tranberry, Pine, Grass, Kenesis, Redstone, etc., from the north cast. Good settlements are found along all these waters, but the good people are practically Good settlements are found along all these waters, but the good people are practically shut in from all outside markets, owing to bad reads and high hills. Money could not be better spent than in opening up these waters as proposed. The data secured by Engineer Hay clearly demonstrates the case with which the work could be done. The accessity of the work is plain to all.
