WHAT THE DOCTOR SAYS.

...lessness of People With Colds Always Hints Very Much.

Sometimes when a woman comes to see me with her complexion the color of ashes, her eyes as bleary as if she had been running in the teeth of a gale for a week without veil or glasses, and her lips a pale pink-blue combination of tints, I feel very much like ordering an ambulance and sending her to a hospital, for there and there only will she be kept in bed and have the care which she needs. A specimen of this type of woman came to ask my medical advice a few days ago. She coughed like a person in the last stages of consumption, her tongue was yellow, her skin was hot and dry, and she said cold chills were chasing each other up and down her back. To begin with, I ordered her home to bed, and she at once rebelled. I asked why. "Well, I have been so busy going out every day that I have hardly had a moment even to come to see you, but I have come simply so that you will give me something to take for my cold and brace me up for my afternoon tea to-morrow."

"And you will receive your guests in a nightgown, madam, or be a dead woman to-morrow night," I said. Of course she took offence and called me a most ungracious and harsh thing, and started to go. Finally she calmed down and told me how she had caught cold. She had it for nearly three weeks; she had taken a hot bath, changed her heavy flannels for light ones, and gone to the house of a friend, a block away to attend a dance. She had walked there with only a long, loose wrap around her besides her light evening gown, because it was such a short distance. The next day she had a cold in her head and chills and fever; so she took a dose of quinine and went out to make calls. She had spent three weeks of activity which makes one exhausted to simply think of. Balls and dinners every night, calling and shopping by day, thin clothes and light shoes, wet feet and no lunch!
