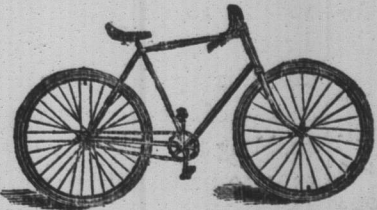

From Bar to Pulpit.

Ira E. Tillotson, a well-known saloon-keeper of Chesterston, is preparing for the ministry. For the last two weeks the Rev. Robert L. Jones, a noted evangelist of Boston, has been holding revival services in the Methodist Church at Chesterston and getting converts from all classes, among them Ira Tillotson. Last night he walked out of his saloon and said he had quit the saloon business forever and would devote the rest of his days to reclaiming the victims of the rum curse. Tillotson is about 35 years old, well educated, of prepossessing appearance and single. He studied medicine when a young man, but in some way drifted to Valparaiso and worked as a bartender. He has remained in the business ever since, tending bar for nearly ever saloon-keeper in Valparaiso and he ran a saloon also for himself. He also worked at the business in Bloomington, Ill., and Hammond, Ind. Tillotson has made and lost fortunes at the poker-table and has seen everything to be seen in gambling-houses and saloons. Unlike Francis Murphy, Tillotson will not quit the business with a fortune, for he is practically a poor man. The Rev. Jones will complete his work at Chesterston this week and leave for a new field, when he will be accompanied by Tillotson, who will assist him in his evangelistic work.

Uses For Old Street Cars.

While the huge traction corporation which has gridironed the city with trolley wires was wondering if it would not be the cheapest way to take the old cars out by the shipload and dump them in some place where they would not interfere with navigation a citizen stepped in and bid \$38 for them. His first move after getting the cars was to put one in the back yard of a friend and to tell the children that they might use it for a playhouse. The children were in ecstasies and set up nights to use the car. Other children came and peered through the pickets of the fence, and went home and teased for a street car. The demand was created, and soon the purveyor of broken down street cars did a rushing business.

Mothers found they could put their small children inside, and, shutting the doors, leave them with a feeling of security. It was the cheapest way, too, in many cases to provide shade. The cars could be secured for \$5 apiece, and the first outlay was the last. So cars were dragged by means of horses into back yards, and the trucks removed from under them, and the brakes taken off. Now that the new industry has been started it is surprising how many uses are being found for these ancient conveyances. At first they were thought of only as playhouses.

One purchaser turns his new acquisition into a henhouse. Another who is a contractor, pays the men every Saturday night from the door of the old car. One man fixed his up as a carpenter shop for his boy, and one enterprising old woman in Cambridge made an offer for ten cars. Her idea was to wheel them down to the seashore and convert them into cottages and bath houses, shifting their position with the tide. Her ingenious scheme, however, was thwarted by the refusal of the owners of the beach to sell her land for the purpose. Now that the ball has been set rolling next summer may see the introduction of "house cars" for the campers out, picnickers and excursionists.—Boston Transcript.

Another Conflagration in Toronto.

Last Sunday Toronto was once more visited with a destructive conflagration, and the loss is greater than that occasioned by either of the fires which recently destroyed so much valuable property in the wholesale district. The four corners at the crossing of Jones and Yonge streets have been swept by the flames, and about \$850,000 or \$900,000 worth of property destroyed. The fire originated in Mr. R. Simpson's departmental store, a new seven story building, and one of the most attractive retail establishments in the city. The building, with its contents, was completely destroyed. The flames crossed Yonge street eastward and destroyed part of the corner building occupied as a branch of the Imperial Bank, J. Milne & Co.'s store and hardware store, the stores occupied by C. M. Henderson & Co., and Danfield & Co., and the Tremont House. The fire stopped in its southward course at the Confectionery Life building, the roof of which received a dangerous scorching. Queen street was also crossed. Mr. P. Jamieson's clothing house and J. Sutcliffe & Sons' dry goods store were destroyed. The fire continued northward, doing considerable damage to the building intervening, and threatening the west, destroying the corner store occupied by J. Bonner, dealer in gent's furnishings, and doing considerable damage to adjacent property. On the south side of Mr. Simpson's building the jewellery store of John Whelan and Co. was considerably damaged. To the west on Queen street the spire of Knox church was burned but the building was saved.
