

A few minutes before 10 o'clock on Saturday night the jury, which for four days and a half had been patiently listening to the evidence in the trial of the mullatto girl, Clara Ford, for the murder of Frank West-wood en October 6th last, returned into court after only one hour's abscence and announced that they found her not guilty of the crime charged.
